And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going.' Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?' Jesus said to him, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him.'

Philip said to him, 'Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied.' Jesus said to him, 'Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, "Show us the Father"? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father and the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.** 

### Sermon

St John gives us a very different account from the other disciples, of the last evening in Jerusalem before the crucifixion, the night of the Last Supper.

It's the evening when he washes the disciples feet. It's the evening when he speaks to them at length, and faces them with important questions.

'Do not let your hearts be troubled, believe in God, believe in me, ... I am going to prepare a place for you ... and will take you to myself.'

Well, the hearts of *many* are troubled at the moment. Troubled by lockdown, lonely, and in some cases grieving. Troubled by a possible <u>e</u>asing of lockdown, with the imagined greater risk of an increase in infection. Troubles of fighting for life and breath, troubles of keeping businesses alive and employees safe, troubles of looking after children. And some of us are better at living with troubles than others; for some, the worries just churn over and over in the mind.

Let not your hearts be troubled. For many, the troubles of this present time are of looking after other people - NHS staff looking after those with serious respiratory problems, care workers looking after the very frail, elderly spouses looking after one another maybe with dementia. But Jesus tells us not to be troubled, because God cares for you. It's perhaps one of the great opportunities of lockdown that we have time to sit and remember that despite all the turmoil of the world, God has a care for us.

Thomas is puzzled by his words though, and says that since he doesn't know where Jesus is going, he can't possibly know the way. Imagination isn't Thomas's strong point, you feel. He is using the idea of Way as a *route*, and wants a map or a 'satnay'. But it may be Jesus is talking less of a route than a *way-of-doing-things*, a *way of being*; Way as being the manner in which you conduct yourself. Thomas is troubled that he can't get a sense of direction, but I don't think Jesus is telling him he has to get out a compass and follow a bearing, or read a complicated series of road signs. Thomas overthinks the problem; what he has to do is follow.

And then there is another statement that I think is often misunderstood. "No one comes to the Father except through me'. Sometimes people take it to be a rather exclusive statement about who will have access to God as if God is only interested in paid-up card-carrying members of the Church of England - or whatever church you may be part of. It's a characteristic of some Christians to want to draw lines around those who are saved and who are not. I think they're mistaken. I don't think it is in the nature of God to be marking some for eternal bliss and some for the chop. I think this outlook has got it the wrong way round.

Surely the nature of Jesus as we see him in the gospels is that he is far more sympathetic to the sinners around him than to the religious elite or the self-satisfied. In his brief years of ministry we see Jesus going out of his way to draw the unlikely and unlovely to himself, the tax-gatherers and sex workers in preference, it seems, than to the Pharisees and Sadducees.

So when he says 'No one comes to the Father except through me', I believe he is saying that he is the way to the Father for all those who <u>may not</u> be the obvious candidates. And the 'obvious candidates' run the very serious risk that they are self-satisfied, see themselves as self-righteous, and have little need for the grace of God. 'Only if you place your trust in me and not in your own godliness will you come to the Father.'

Now if Thomas was short of imagination, maybe Philip was as well. 'Show us the Father' he asks. And it's a kind of easily understood desire. Give us the answer, save us from all this bother. There's a story of a little girl who could have saved us all the trouble.

"What are you drawing?" a teacher leans over and asks a little girl who was drawing a picture in school one day.

"God," the little girl responds.

The teacher laughed and said, "No one knows what God looks like,"

"They will when I finish this drawing," said the little girl.

"Show us who God is," Phillip says. "Show us the grandeur and majesty of divine glory. Show us God Almighty in splendour and magnificence. Show us ultimate cosmic power. Show us God's brilliant light in a dark and sinful world."

"Show us what the world and existence is all about. Show us that our lives are connected somehow to Eternal Life. Show us that God really cares about us. Show us that God is somehow active in the world and in our lives." These are some of the ways people put that question today.

"Are you really asking me that?" Jesus asks, not really believing Phillip still wasn't getting it.

"Have you been with me all this time and you STILL haven't figured this out? If you want to know who God is, just look at me. Look at what I do, listen to what I say. God is in me and I am in God."

God is in Jesus and Jesus is in God. Christians believe that in the life, death, and resurrection, we have seen God. That's the grand claim of today's gospel. When we see Jesus, how he lived in the world, when we hear Jesus, the words he spoke to his first followers, the words he speaks to us today, we know, by the power of the Holy Spirit opening our minds and tugging at our hearts, that we have seen, heard, and felt God. Emmanuel. God with us.

We have a God who loved us too much to remain distant and unapproachable. And yet we expect him to look completely different, and so miss him righting front of us. The following day, Jesus was asked by Pilate, 'What is truth?' as if the answer could have been spoken.

<u>Our</u> task is to be witnesses to what we know. We believe and know that Jesus is the Way, the truth and the life. If you want to find your way to God, he is the way. And the way is the way of the cross, a life full of risk and uncertainty, a way of service, kneeling and washing feet with a towel wrapped around you, the work of the household slave.

'Have I been with you *all this time*, and still you do not know me?' Jesus says to Philip.

It's a chastening rebuke.

God is among us, all over the place, with those in Covid wards in hospital, with those in Care homes where their families can't visit them, caring for children off-school, and emptying the bins. He's doing the work of a servant for us, under the radar, behind the scenes.

Do not let your hearts be troubled; believe me because of the works themselves.

Christ is risen and God is among us, Alleluia, **Amen**.
