Today is the Fifth Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Passiontide. Our minds turn to the suffering of Jesus as he draws near to Jerusalem. It was to be the day when our new Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher visited St Margaret's, and it was to be the day when seven members were Confirmed by him; one of them was to be baptised, and then all were to affirm their faith in God Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as he laid hands on them.

But God sometimes has surprises in store for us so now we exercise the fruits of the spirit in lives of patience and self-restraint as we self-isolate.

The Psalms give us wonderful texts that so often chime with our experience and emotion. The Psalm set for this morning is Ps 130.

Psalm 130

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications!

If you, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But there is forgiveness with you, so that you may be revered.

I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I hope; my soul waits for the Lord more than those who watch for the morning, more than those who watch for the morning.

O Israel, hope in the Lord!
For with the Lord there is steadfast love, and with him is great power to redeem.
It is he who will redeem Israel from all its iniquities.

Confession:

God of truth and justice, we have not lived up to the great gifts that you have given to us. Have mercy on us; strengthen us in the certainty of your forgiveness and enduring love. Teach us how to respond to this greatest of gifts in lives full of grace, bearing fruit in our own love and forgiveness, witnessing always to your glory and your graciousness. We ask this in the name of your Son Jesus Christ. Amen.

If God kept track of all our mistakes—
the harmful things we say, and do,
the callous way we sometimes treat the people around us,
the selfishness that puts our needs ahead of the needs of others—
if God kept track, what chance would we have?

But with unfailing love, God offers us forgiveness—complete forgiveness that erases our sins completely, and allows us to begin again.

So be at peace – your sins are forgiven!

Romans 8.6-11

To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

A few thoughts:

We have become increasingly preoccupied with the Coronavirus in the last few weeks. Reports about it are everywhere, and the selfisolating that many of us are practicing occupies our thoughts. St Paul's words are a challenge. He contrasts the flesh and the Spirit, and talks about the flesh in rather disparaging terms. And when we think of the health workers, putting their own health at risk for the rest of us, that seems an unworthy contrast. But Paul's argument is in fact different. His contrast between the flesh and the Spirit is between those who live in the knowledge of the love and saving grace of God - the Spirit - and those who believe their heritage and ancestry gives them an advantage in God's pecking order. They believed they had privileged access to God. Paul came to see that God is not bothered in the slightest about where you have come from, highborn or low, or about the colour of your skin. What interests him is where you are going. While we worry about issues of health, which is only right, let us not forget the issues of our faith, and how God calls us to be led by the Spirit whose fruits are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

These are times when patience and self-control will be particular

gifts we have to exercise as we try to live in God's Holy Spirit.
